INDIAN RED CROSS SOCIETY: AN INTRODUCTION

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is a voluntary humanitarian organization having a network of over 1200 branches throughout the country, providing relief in times of disasters/emergencies and it promotes health & care of the vulnerable people and communities. IRCS as one of the National Societies forms part of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, comprising of ICRC, IFRC and 191 National Societies and follows the seven Fundamental Principles of the Movement.

IRCS was established in 1920 under the Indian Red Cross Society Act and incorporated under Parliament Act XV of 1920. Hon'ble President of India is the President and Hon'ble Union Health Minister is the Chairman of the Society. The Managing Body is responsible for governance and supervision of the functions of the society through a number of committees. The National Managing Body consists of 19 members including Chairman. The Chairman and 6 members are nominated by the President. The remaining 12 members are elected by the State and Union Territory branches through an electoral college.

The Indian Red Cross's mission is to inspire, encourage, and always initiate humanitarian endeavors to alleviate suffering among people and thus contribute to foster a more hospitable environment for peace.

The objective of the Society is to provide humanitarian and charitable services including medical relief, healthcare, blood services, first aid and allied services, disaster risk reduction and response, with other ancillary services to prevent and mitigate suffering of the people without discrimination as to nationality, race, caste, sex, religious beliefs, language, class or political opinion.

The Society's function include:

- a) To provide emergency relief services for the victims of disasters and work towards mitigation of their suffering.
- b) To provide blood services.
- c) To provide ambulance services.
- d) To contribute to the improvement of health, the prevention of disease, maternity, childcare and elderly care in the country.
- e) Capacity building and training of the volunteers & staff.
- f) Promote the participation of more and more youth with Society.
- g) To promote the Fundamental Principals of International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement.
- h) To represent the Society on or at international platforms and other committees.
- i) To endeavour towards establishment and maintenance of global peace.
- j) To provide aid to sick, wounded or demobilized members of Armed Forces of the union in accordance with terms and spirit of Geneva Conventions of 12th August 1949.
- k) To act in case of armed conflict, and in peace to prepare to act in all fields covered by the Geneva Conventions.

DISASTER MANAGEMENT

This section provides an overview of our activities and achievements in the areas of disaster mitigation, response and recovery during the year 22-23.

During the year, IRCS responded to several emergencies in various parts of the country, such as floods, earthquakes, landslides, accidents, conflicts etc. Our teams provided critical assistance to affected communities, including shelter, food, water, sanitation, and health services. In addition to our emergency response efforts, IRCS also focused on building the capacity of communities and local partners to prepare for and respond to disasters. We conducted training sessions on disaster preparedness and response, community-based first aid, and psychosocial support to empower individuals and communities to be better prepared for disasters.

A. <u>Disaster Response</u> During the year, floods, landslides, cyclones, cold waves and incidents of fire and road/rail accidents affected many parts of the country. State/UT branches namely *Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, West Bengal, Uttarakhand, Telangana, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry, Maharashtra, Delhi, Punjab, Chhattisgarh, Himachal Pradesh, Odisha, Uttar Pradesh, and Karnataka* were affected badly by floods, landslides, cold wave, fires, and cyclones. IRCS immediately responded to the disasters and dispatched relief materials from existing stocks at different warehouses.

Every day, people in our community and around the country face emergencies, big or small. From more frequent and intense natural disasters, and life-threatening blood shortages, to the unique challenges and more. Powered by critical support from donors and a dedicated workforce—more than 90% volunteers—the Red Cross has the capacity to deliver aid speedily in any part of the country.

B. Supplies received in-kind from IFRC, Canadian Red Cross, American Red Cross & ICRC under Foreign donation for FY 2022-23

During the financial year 2022-23, IRCS NHQ received supplies (Annexure-1) worth INR 147,67,00,823 (Approx.) with support from IFRC, ICRC and other partner National Societies. The supplies include 153 no. of vehicles (Ambulances-69, Blood Collection Vans-48, Mobile Testing Van-22 & Mobile Health Units-14), ICU items (ICU Beds and other equipments-11 types of equipment, a total 525 quantity, delivered in 8 locations), Blood Bank equipment (Blood Bank equipment - 21 types of equipment numbering 1233 delivered at 115 locations), tarpaulins (91,960) & Kitchen Sets (75,000). These supplies had been delivered to the IRCS State/UT branches.

C. Procurement of 47,700 Nos of Kitchen sets from M/S Selam steel

D. Construction of Warehouse at Uttarakhand Office Premises



The state of Uttarakhand is a disaster-prone state which falls into seismic zone IV & V and has experienced regular disasters consisting of earthquakes, flash floods, cloud bursts, landslides and glacial lake outburst due to melting of glaciers.

Approval was accorded to construct the warehouse in an area of 330.48 sqm on following conditions:

- 1) 50% of the constructed space should be used to generate rental income for the branch.
- 2) IRCS NHQ to support 90% of the total budget of cost of construction including cost Escalation, if any, due to unforeseen reasons. Remaining 10% will be met by the Uttarakhand State Branch.

Present Status

- 1) The Uttrakhand State Branch got the work done through M/s. Payjal Nigam, a State Govenment undertaking for a total cost of Rs.1,41,98,567.81
- 2) Construction of the warehouse was completed in the month of December 2022.



3) The State Branch has rented out 126 Sq Mtr at the rate of Rs. 150 per square meter to Uttarakhand State AIDS control Society on 1.1.2023.

E. Major Disaster Responses

IRCS Responded to Floods, 2022 (Assam, Odisha, Himachal Pradesh & other States)



Lakhs of people were affected and displaced by the floods in 29 out of 33 districts in Assam in 2022. Heavier than usual rains submerged several villages, forcing locals to seek shelter in squalid conditions, sometimes even on roads. Responding to the emergency IRCS, Guwahati district branch organised several relief and rescue camps and provided aid (Food, Shelter & hygiene kits etc.) to the vulnerable & needy.





Keeping in view the severe floods in Assam & other different states of India, IRCS, NHQ released relief items such as family rehabilitation kits, hygiene kits, soaps, mosquito nets, kitchen sets, tarpaulins etc. The district branches of IRCS, in flood-affected states,





continuously worked in close coordination with the district administration & helped the needy & vulnerable by providing them relief materials.

II. Collapse of the suspension bridge in Morbi, Gujarat; A nearly 100-year-old suspension bridge over the Machchhu River in Gujarat's Morbi collapsed on 30th October 2022. More than 130 persons died in this tragedy. A team of 25 Red Cross volunteers led by Chairman Sh. Ajaybhai H. Patel reached within short span of time to rescue the victims. Considering the numbers of injured people, the officers of the Health Department were worried about the availability



of blood. The Commissioner of Health dept. requested the Red Cross to ensure the supply of sufficient blood. On the request of the Red Cross around 120 volunteers donated their blood and maintained the stock of each blood group. 433 units of blood were collected for the needy.

III. Relief assistance to the victims of Joshimath landslide; The holy town of Joshimath had plunged into a full-blown crisis after houses and roads developed cracks due to land subsidence. The crisis displaced thousands of people. The Youth Red Cross volunteers continuously engaged in humanitarian service without caring for themselves in response to Joshimath's tragedy and provided relief assistance to the needy and vulnerable.





COVID RESPONSE - (2022-2023)



The COVID-19 pandemic had taken a staggering toll on lives, health, social and economic wellbeing in every nation in the world. This crisis – including the disease itself, its knock-on effects and the measures taken to combat it – has caused increased unemployment and poverty; increased food insecurity; a higher vulnerability to violence; loss of education and added stress to public services. It has also exacerbated mental health issues.

From the start of the outbreak, the Indian Red Cross Society was declared an essential service provider by the Government of India. IRCS helped people around the country to survive and cope during and beyond this pandemic, while continuing to respond to many other concurrent disasters and crises. Indian Red Cross Society in the first and second wave of pandemic had reached over a billion people with health services, information, food etc. to prevent transmission and curb the pandemic. The Red Cross worked closely with the authorities to care for those who need it most, including the elderly and people with disabilities during the pandemic.

During the FY 22-23, Indian Red Cross branches across the country supported the vaccination drive, providing vaccinations, running vaccine awareness campaigns, and offering Red Cross clinics and medical facilities as vaccination centers.

BLOOD SERVICES

The Blood Services of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) continued to be a significant area of focus during the year 2022-23. The program played a crucial role in ensuring adequate supply of safe blood and blood products to patients in need, particularly during disasters or any other crisis.



Transfusion of blood is an essential part of modern health care management. IRCS has a robust blood processing and testing infrastructure, with over 97 blood banks across 15 States/ UTs and blood storage centers across the country. During the year, IRCS continued to invest in modernizing its blood processing and testing facilities, ensuring the safety and quality of blood and blood products. Over 5 lakh people donated blood at IRCS Blood Banks across the country in the year 2022-23 and over 12 lakh people were motivated through blood donation drives of our IRCS branches across the country.

The Blood Centre is running round the clock and provides services to the needy patients. It was designated as Regional Blood Centre by State Govt. in 1996 and has been designated as Model Blood Bank in 2010 by National AIDS Control Organization, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India and is Certified by the BIS for ISO 9001:2015 and accredited by NABH & NABL.

This Blood Centre focuses on encouraging voluntary blood donations. It collects approximately 30,000 units of blood annually. The percentage of voluntary blood collection is 100% in IRCS Blood Centre. The Blood Centre provides about 70% of total collection of blood free of service charges to the patients admitted in Govt. Hospitals in Delhi, HIV/AIDS patients, patients below poverty line, thalassaemia patients, haemophilia patients and sickle cell anemia patients. 900 thalassaemic patients are registered with IRCS, NHQ (which is about 50% of all the thalassaemics in Delhi).

The IRCS (NHQ) Blood Centre is fully equipped to collect blood at its premises and also has mobile teams, which go out frequently to hold Blood Donation Camps. The blood, after collection, is tested for HIV I & II, HBs Ag, HCV, VDRL & Malaria. Blood grouping with Rh D and Antibodies Testing (three cell panel) is done by fully automated advance technology. To ensure effective utilization of blood, besides supplying whole blood, Red Cross also has the facility of component separation that provides different components of blood, like fresh frozen plasma, platelet rich plasma, platelet concentrate, packed cells, cryoprecipitate and platelet aphaeresis.

A. Blood Donation Camps

IRCS continued to organize blood donation camps across the country, with safety measures in place to protect donors and staff. These camps were critical in maintaining an adequate supply of blood and blood products for patients in need. IRCS also collaborated with corporate partners and other organizations to organize blood donation drives, resulting in an increase in the number of donors.

Highlights of major camps: -

- **1370** blood donors were provided by Sant Nirankari Mandal in **13** camps during Covid pandemic.
- Blood Donation Camp was organized at Parliament House on 13th December, 2022 to mark the 17th Commemoration Day of the supreme sacrifice made by Security Personnel on the altar of duty while thwarting the attack of terrorists on Parliament House on 13-12-2001.
 150 people paid homage to the departed souls and saluted their martyrdom by donating blood voluntarily, including their family members.
- A total number of **678** units were collected from the voluntary donors in a camp conducted in BITS, Pilani, Rajasthan, from 27th to 30th January 2023. This has been an annual feature for the last over 3 decades.
- During Dengue Viral Haemorrhagic fever the demand for platelets increased manifolds. IRCS, NHQ Blood Centre organised 60 blood donation camps and 2799 units of lifesaving platelet concentrates were prepared and issued to both Government and Private hospitals in and around Delhi round the clock for patients.
- A total of 539 blood donors were provided by JBM (Neel Foundation) in 03 camps organized by them.
- During the year 2022-23, 51726 total Blood/Blood components were prepared. The total 17052 units of blood components were issued free of cost to the patients admitted in Government Hospitals, thalassaemic and haemophilic patients.
- **13210** units of blood were issued against processing charges to the patients admitted in private hospitals/ nursing homes.
- During the year 2022-23, Blood Centre, Indian Red Cross Society at National Headquarter collected a total of 23065 units of blood from voluntary blood donors. A total of 366 Blood Donation Camps were conducted in various places like Educational Institutions, Corporate Sectors, Religious/Social Organizations, and other offices.

B. Screening, Processing & Storage of Blood

Blood is tested for infectious diseases (TTIs) such as HIV, HBs Ag, VDRL & HCV and blood group serology. The screening of Transfusion Transmitted Infectious Marker (TTIs) is done by ELISA Method.

C. Other Beneficiaries of Blood Centre (NHQ) to whom blood components are issued (2022-23)

- a) Thalassemia: In Delhi, there are about 2000 registered thalassemic patients who are receiving blood from various Regional Centers like AIIMS, RML Hospital, Hindu Rao Hospital, LNJP Hospital, GTB Hospital and private blood banks. Out of them 900 patients are registered with Red Cross Blood Centre and more than 200 registered patients are from outside Delhi. IRCS continues to look after approx. 50% of the thalassemic patients in and around Delhi and provides Blood/Blood Components to them.
- b) Support to National Plasma Fractionation Centre (NPFC): IRCS (NHQ) Blood Centre is a NACO supported blood component Separation Unit. As per NACO guidelines IRCS, Blood Centre has largely supported the Reliance Life Sciences Pvt. Ltd. by sending the surplus Plasma/FFP for fractionation. In the year 2022-23, IRCS (NHQ), Blood Centre has issued about 21430 units of surplus plasma/FFP to Reliance Life Sciences Pvt. Ltd.

D. Accreditation

Certificate of accreditation for ISO by BIS, NABH and NABL: The IRCS (NHQ) Blood Centre has been certified by IS/ISO 9001:2015, NABH and NABL w.e.f 2012 and 2013. Routine surveillance audit for the accreditation has been conducted by the auditor team in 2022-23 by BIS, NABL and NABH for renewal of accreditation.

- **E.** External Quality Assurance Programme (EQAS) IRCS (NHQ) Blood Centre has been enrolled with SDMH, Jaipur, (BEQAS), CMC Vellore, AIIMS and Mumbai Red Cross for proficiency for infectious marker and serology testing.
- **F.** <u>Training:</u> Trainings were provided by IRCS (NHQ), Blood Centre to doctors, lab. technicians of Govt. hospitals and interns from different Institutions to enrich their knowledge on overview of procedures for testing in blood services, safety parameters & transfusion quality management system (TQMS) related. The visit facilitates the Blood Banks in strengthening the standards of Blood Services which were learnt during the training period and spreads awareness while enlightening the students for blood donations.

Training was imparted on Automated Cell counter, Automated Blood grouping technique, transfusion transmitted infections (TTIs), ADR monitoring, Blood component preparation, Plasma components and documentation of processes.






IRCS, NHQ, Blood Centre posted a pledge to donate blood regularly on IRCS twitter and face book page - 10906 people visited on twitter and 1376 people reached facebook on 14.6.22.





2. Celebration of National Blood Donation Day

IRCS, NHQ, Blood Centre conducted blood donation camp at LNS Aparajita Indirapuram, Ghaziabad as well as in Red Cross. One weeklong programme (1.10.22 to 07.10.22) was organized to enhance voluntary blood donation by spreading the message of Voluntary Blood Donation.

I. IFRC Support for Strengthening the IRCS, Blood Centers

In an appeal raised by IFRC, around INR 164 Crs. meant for IRCS for Covid-19 response was received by them. A part of this fund was used to provide equipment to strengthen existing Blood Centers and 22 new Blood Centers in different states. The State/UT branches were consulted for the locations of 22 new Blood Centers. The equipment was provided and installed by the supplier at the destination. Some of the equipment, which was provided to blood centers are refrigerators, BCM, tube sealer, ELISA set, donor couch, refrigerated transportation boxes. These blood centers were also given blood collection vans (3 or 5 couches) which will increase voluntary blood collection in their centers.



IFRC support for strengthening the IRCS Blood Centers



With the support of our international partners, IRCS has been able to provide 69 Ambulances, 59 blood collection vans and 39 mobile health units and testing vans to various Red Cross branches in 27 states and UT's. With these, more than 160 additional vehicles, the field branches are now better equipped to serve the needs of their communities.

IRCS, NHQ initiated training on Blood Centre application "ERaktkosh" for the newly formed Blood Centre in Chennai from 15-16 December, 2022.

As we look ahead, IRCS's Blood Services program will continue to focus on expanding blood donation camps and drives, strengthening our blood processing and testing facilities, and enhancing our community awareness and education programs. We will also work to improve access to blood and blood products for underserved communities across the country.

FUND RAISING & MEMBERSHIP

Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) got the support of its donors, partners and others to support its programs and services during the year. The fundraising and membership activities of IRCS played a vital role in ensuring the sustainability of the organization. The Indian Red Cross Society sources its funds for the welfare activities through various channels. Enrolment of members by its branches in different categories is an important source of fund raising. These enrolments are made in accordance with Rule 3 of the Indian Red Cross Rules 1994.

Of late IRCS, NHQ has been gradually moving towards digitization. In the field of membership as well it has been implemented.

IRCS branches organized several fundraising activities during the year, including appeals through website, social media platforms, and other channels. We also organized special campaigns to support our disaster response efforts, which received a significant response. The organization also received generous support from individual donors, corporate partners, and international organizations.

We are grateful for the support of our donors, members, and partners during the year 2022-23, and we look forward to their continued support in the years to come. With their support, we are confident that we can continue to provide services to vulnerable populations across the country.

FIRST AID TRAINING

The First Aid training program of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) continued to be an essential area of focus during the year 2022-23. The program played a crucial role in building the capacity of individuals and communities to respond effectively to emergencies and disasters.

IRCS continued to collaborate with the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and ICRC to share best practices and enhance its first aid training programs. These collaborations allowed us to learn from the experiences of other countries and improve the quality of our trainings & services.

IRCS, NHQ has been making efforts to streamline the trainings in first aid being held all through the country by the branches. One of the initiatives has been to hold online examinations for evaluating the competence of the trainees.

<u>Pilot phase of Online First Aid/Home Nursing & allied subjects Examination of IRCS & St John (I)</u>



First Aid, Home Nursing and allied courses trainings are imparted to the aerodrome staff, communities, drivers & conductors, armed forces, police, mines & factories staff, NCC, civil defence, home guard, railway employees, teachers, students and the general public. 8 days training (minimum 16 hours) is mandatory for professional certificates before taking the First Aid examination. This First Aid certificate is mandatory for some streams of jobs. Other than the professional certificates, there are some FA trainings in the corporates, which can be of a minimum of 3 days with a minimum training of 16 hours.

The pilot phase of project was started in Delhi, Punjab, and Haryana from 23 Nov, 29 Nov and 01 December, 2022 respectively. The key features are as follows:

- 1. Online registration of candidates (Individual/Corporate & Student)
- 2. Online payment on final registration
- 3. Online creation of batches by Training Centres & provision to select batch by the candidates.
- 4. Centralized attendance recording and calculation for qualifying for examination based on attendance.
- 5. Multilingual question paper based on the level of examination.
- 6. Theory examinations on tabs provided by the vendor who is responsible for providing infrastructure for examination.
- 7. Practical examination by the Training Centre examiner and marks to be given on tab itself.
- 8. Immediate release of result
- 9. Certificate generation after 5 days of examination

In the duration of 4 months, from Dec 2022-March 2023, 7350 examinations were conducted in the 3 pilots states and the certificates were generated online and available in candidate's login in the downloadable format. The process is ongoing. The certificates can also be verified online.

IRCS-ICRC COOPERATION ACTIVITY

The IRCS- ICRC supported programmes and activities to disseminate correct and proper use of Red Cross Emblem to minimise its misuse; awareness programmes on Fundamental Principles First Aid, Junior & Youth Red Cross Program, and World Red Cross Day celebrations.

During the year the IRCS-ICRC cooperation activity covered eight states and NHQ to conduct following activities: -

- First Aid training
- Youth Program
- Restoring family link (RFL services)
- Emergency prepositioning
- Digital transformation

a) Master trainers in first aid

IRCS imparts training in First Aid for the benefit of general public and employees of companies, factories, corporates and others through its branches. The trainings are imparted by Instructors/Lay Lecturers authorized by the National Headquarters for the purpose. The Instructors/Lay Lecturers are assessed for their efficiency periodically by Master Trainers deputed by the National Headquarters. Master Trainers are selected by the National Headquarters from among the Instructors/ Lay Lecturers on the basis of their extra ability and mastery over the subject.

IRCS NHQ decided to conduct three First Aid Master Trainer's (FA-MT) training program at different locations with the support of IRCS State Branches and ICRC during FY 22-23.

- 1. First Aid Master Trainers training hosted by IRCS Telangana state Branch from 1-5 November 2022.
- First Aid Master Trainers training conducted at Faridabad & Delhi from 28th February to 4th March 2023.

From these two above trainings, 25 participants qualified as the Indian Red Cross Society Master Trainers. Apart from the above First Aid trainings, IRCS Bihar State Branch conducted five days First Aid Lay Lectures training from 11 to 15 October 2022.

INTERNATIONAL MOVEMENT COOPERATION

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) continued to work closely with the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement partners during the year 2022-23. The International Movement Cooperation program played a critical role in strengthening our relationships with other National Societies and partners around the world.

IRCS collaborated with the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) and International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) to respond to disasters and emergencies, share best practices, and learn from the experiences of other countries. These collaborations allowed us to enhance our programs and services and better serve vulnerable populations across the country.

PARTICIPATION OF IRCS IN INTERNATIONAL EVENTS

IRCS participated in international events and conferences organized by partners and others. These events provided us with opportunities to share our experiences and learn from other National Societies and partners.

Some of the programs

 a) Statutory meetings of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and International Committee of Red Cross Societies. Secretary General, IRCS, Sh. R.K Jain attended the Statutory Meetings at





Palexpo, Geneva from 18th June, 2022 till 23rd June, 2022. These meetings were attended by Red Cross Leaders and Delegations from more than 170 countries. The Governance & Management of National Societies, IFRC & ICRC were present. IRCS, NHQ National Managing Body Member, Mrs. Sushma Gupta also attended the meetings. Prior to the Statutory Meetings, Asia Pacific National Society Leadership Meeting was also held on 18th June, 2022. During the meetings elections to the Governing board of the IFRC were also held.

- B) Secretary General visits Singapore: Secretary General, Sh. R.K. Jain, was invited by the Singapore Red Cross Society in its Humanitarian Conference held on 10th September 2022. Other National Societies along with experts were invited especially to share their views on Covid-19 pandemic management. Sh. R.K Jain was one of the key speakers in this conference.
- c) A Workshop on Disaster Law & Legislative Advocacy in South Asia & Enhancing Resilience in South Asia through Disaster Law was held on 19th 24th Nov 2022 at Male, Maldives. It was organised by IFRC & hosted by the Maldivian Red Crescent. Deputy Secretary, IRCS, NHQ, Sh. N.K Singh along with Mr. Ahmad Obaidus Sami, Program Coordinator, South Asia Regional



Delegation at IFRC attended the workshops. The focus was to train the participants of the National Societies on advocacy strategy, analyze the national disaster laws of the countries in the region & look for opportunities of working together on new threats. Along with the National Societies, officials of the SARC countries also participated.

d) A Webinar on Digital Emblem? Benefits, Risks and Possible Solutions was hosted on 3rd November 2022, by ICRC in virtual mode. Ms. Rani Vibhushita, Communication Manager, IRCS, NHQ attended the webinar. The report on 'Digitalizing the Red Cross, Red Crescent, and Red Crystal Emblems: Benefits, Risks and Possible Solutions' was launched during the event. This

report presents cutting-edge research and innovative findings on the idea of a "digital emblem", discussing its operational relevance and explaining technical solutions. It also highlights the benefits of developing such emblem and possible risks. The event was chaired by Félix Baumann, Ambassador and Deputy Permanent Representative, Switzerland and a keynote address by ICRC Vice President Gilles Carbonnier, along with five expert panellists.



- e) IRCS, Secretary General, Sh. R.K Jain attended a virtual meeting held in preparation of the **34th** International Conference of the Red Cross and Red Crescent and the **2024** Council of Delegates on 22nd March 2023.
- f) **South Asia National Society Leadership Meeting** took place on 18th April. In this virtual meeting IRCS was represented by the Secretary General.

- g) Sh. N.K Singh, Deputy Secretary attended an online meeting of the Steering Committee for Implementation of GRMS on 23rd March, 2023. Updates on global KPI's were shared. The spotlight of the meeting was a discussion on the ways to overcome challenges to resource mobilization and fundraising capacity development of National Societies.
- h) IRCS, NHQ, Deputy Secretary, Sh. N.K Singh attended an online meeting on the Global launch of IFRC, Organizational Assessment Toolkit for Protection, Gender, and Inclusion to better promote the invaluable diversity of its membership and embrace equity, on International Women's Day, 8th March 2023. IFRC Secretary General, Mr. Jagan Chapagain, PGI experts, National Societies Leaders participated in the event.



First lot of 33 vehicles (13 ALS Ambulances, 20 BLS Ambulances) were sent to improve the health & disaster response capacity of IRCS branches.

STATUTORY MEETINGS OF IRCS (NHQ)

a) IRCS, NHQ Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 17th May 2022: Dr. Mansukh Mandaviya, Hon'ble Chairman, Indian Red Cross Society (Hon'ble Minister of Health and Family Welfare) presided over the Annual General Meeting of Indian Red Cross Society at IRCS, NHQ, New Delhi on 17th May, 2022. This AGM took place in virtual mode due to the Corona pandemic.



Hon'ble Chairman expressed his pleasure on the 150 ambulances, blood collection vans & testing vans that were being given to the Red Cross branches & blood centers in the country to deliver health & blood services at the doorsteps of the people.

IRCS, Hon'ble Chairman emphasised on the participation of all actors in the development sector, including Red Cross, to eradicate tuberculosis from this country. During the AGM announcements for awards including Red Cross Gold Medal, Red Cross Merit Certificates, Red Cross Fundraising & Membership & Red Cross Highest no. of voluntary blood collection for FY 2019 -20 & 2020-21 were made.



b) IRCS, State/UT Branch Leadership Meeting 2022, (Chintan Shivir): IRCS, State/ UT Branch Leadership Chintan Shivir was held on 22nd – 23rd September 2022 at National Institute of Health and Family Welfare, New Delhi.

The meeting was inaugurated by Hon'ble Chairman IRCS (Hon'ble HFM and Minister for Chemicals & Fertilizers, GoI) Dr. Mansukh Mandaviya.



This meeting was aimed to discuss the functioning of the branches & brainstorming issues relating to transparency in the functioning of Red Cross; first aid training; property & warehouse management; fundraising; self-sufficiency; blood services; utilization of the donations received in cash & kind; automation at NHQ & the branches etc. The branches contributed in the meeting enthusiastically & shared their concerns, problems & other issues along with their best practices. During the Leadership Meeting Hon'ble Chairman emphasised on the National Tuberculosis & Leprosy Eradication Programme seeking Red Cross involvement to reach the remote inaccessible pockets.







c) State/ UT Branch, Leadership Meeting was held in virtual mode on 18th Nov, 2022. The focus subjects in the meeting were to review the status of Leprosy & TB eradication initiative, review the status of the delivery & utilization of the vehicles provided to the branches & purchase of Blood Centre equipment for equipping existing blood centres and new blood centres.

OTHER IMPORTANT MEETINGS

 In an important function at Raj Bhawan, Jaipur presided over by Hon'ble Governor Sh.Kalraj Mishra (Hon'ble President IRCS, Rajasthan) MoUs were signed and exchanged between IRCS & 24 Universities of Rajasthan.



2. On 23rd August, 2022 IRCS, NHQ officers interacted with the Canadian Red Cross team through video conferencing. The CRC team was led by Mr. Kelsey Lemon, Vice President. CRC has funds to be used in India for which ideas were exchanged. IRCS has informed the CRC that the project shall be taken up for implementation after internal consultation at IRCS & the necessary approvals from competent authorities.



3. Google teams Bihar visit in September 2022. The team reviewed the progress of the Flood Early Warning Google Project in Bihar. They shared their thoughts during the debriefing session held at the State Branch, which was presided over by the Chairman of the Bihar State Branch.



4. During the month of October & November 2022, the NHQ held meetings with Maharashtra, Punjab, Haryana, Gujarat, J&K, Manipur, Uttarakhand, Andhra Pradesh, Meghalaya, Bihar, Jharkhand, Goa, Chandigarh, Puducherry, Chhattisgarh & Tamil Nadu State branches

for Reconciliation and Settlement of Working Advances to ease the process of releasing the project fund to them.

5. State/ UT Branch Leadership Meeting; The meeting of the State/UT Branch leadership was held in virtual mode on 31st Jan 2023. The Action Taken Report (ATR) received from the branches was discussed. Non-responsive branches were urged to forward the ATR to National Headquarters. It was also informed that online reconciliation meetings with 19 branches had been held to settle outstanding balances. It was clarified that branches are not permitted to open FCRA accounts. However, they must have a dedicated utilization account



to receive FOREX funds through National Headquarters. The Tuberculosis and Leprosy projects were also discussed. The status of the single online platform, as well as the delivery and utilization of vehicles and blood centre equipment, were discussed.

6. IFRC Certification Working Group; Secretary General Sh. R.K. Jain attended a virtual meeting on IFRC Certification Working Group, from 7th to 9th February,2023. The different processes in IFRC certification were discussed like due diligence, capacity assessments, best practices etc. The major topics on which discussions were held were legal base & leadership, community engagement & accountability, duty& care & safeguarding, financial accountability, monitoring and evaluation & reporting etc.

YOUTH PROGRAM

a) Background

IRCS NHQ and branches have been running Junior and Youth Red Cross activities since 1925. Juniors are the students in the schools registered under the programme. Similarly, Youth are the members that are enrolled through their colleges registered by the Red Cross branches at the local level. The programme has a very large membership as most of the Govt. run schools are covered. This is one of the important Red Cross activities throughout the world.

IRCS injected fresh life into the Youth Programme with the support of ICRC in schools/colleges and communities in the selected States. The target states for this programme were Maharashtra, Gujarat, Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Assam, Manipur, Meghalaya, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Telangana and Jammu & Kashmir. This program has three key objectives —

- To enhance the understanding of the Red Cross Red Crescent Movement and its Fundamental Principles.
- Promote peace and harmony among the youth and the selected communities.
- To strengthen the capacity of the YRC regarding hygiene promotion, household water treatment, basic first- aid and promote peace and harmony in society.
- To contribute towards increasing the awareness on role of youth and behavioral changes in the selected communities on hygiene promotion, household water treatment and basic first aid.

b) Several activities were undertaken during the FY 22-23 in State/UT branches

 Indian Red Cross Society, Odisha State Branch organized one day Orientation of Youth Program. The Counsellors & Volunteers from selected 8 colleges of three districts participated.





ii. The YRC Counselors of the nominated colleges participated with two YRC volunteers & one community volunteer in the one-day youth Orientation program. After completion of all session a detailed program plan and date were provided to all the counselors and also timeline fixed with them for conducting the program. The orientation program was concluded with vote of thanks to the chair.





- iii. On 10th September, 2023, DKN College Eranch, Cuttack organized a district level Orientation program at the college premises. Volunteers of D.K.N College, U.N Autonomous College and Govindpur Higher Secondary School participated in the Orientation program. Sastri Smurti Degree College also organized the program in the college premises and the volunteers of other two selected colleges participated in it.
- iv. On 18th September, 2023 the Marshaghai college, Marshaghai, Kendrapara organized the district level orientation program in the college premises and the selected volunteers of Chitroptala Womens college participated in it.





Youth groups observed World First Aid Day, 2023 day in Kendrapara, Cuttack & Puri district. Basic First Aid training session was also organized.

c) Other Youth Activities

- i. Inter State Youth Red Cross training camp (for boys) was held from 16-21 March 2023 at Kurukshetra -IRCS Haryana. 189 people participated in this camp.
- ii. The Junior Red Cross online meeting was organized by Japanese Red Cross on 5th & 6th Nov, 2023. Youth group of Maharashtra state branch attended the meeting.
- iii. Awareness on Feminine Hygiene and Distribution of Sanitary Napkins: The drive was conducted in the month of April at Morarji Nagar Slums, Powai The Awareness Drive was held on 11th April 2022. 70 girls from economically weaker sections of society participated in this campaign. The girls were briefed about the importance of Menstrual Hygiene by Mrs. Joyce Pinto, Secretary, Junior Red Cross. Free packs (12 pcs) of sanitary pads were distributed to all girls.
- iv. Navsanjivni Foundation, Kurla Vashi Nakka An awareness drive was held on 26th April 2022 at Kurla Vashi Nakka, Mumbai. 75 girls from economically weaker sections of the Society participated in this campaign. Mrs. Joyce Pinto, Secretary, Junior Red Cross asked the girls about the feedback of Sanitary Pads given to them in the month of March. The girls expressed their happiness on getting the pads free of cost from Junior Red Cross, Maharashtra. Some girls were accompanied by their parents. The girls were mainly from economically backward sections of the society. Free packs (12 pcs) of sanitary pads were distributed to all girls.





v. Annual International Youth Exchange Programme 2022 hosted by the Japanese Red Cross. In the online program Maharashtra State Branch youth were deputed to participate in it.



vi. The Indian Red Cross Society Gujarat State Branch, in collaboration with Indian Red Cross Society, NHQ, is currently conducting the Youth Program 2023.

Districts Chosen: The programme was implemented in three districts - Ahmedabad, Vadodara, and Rajkot. To upscale the programme following activities were undertaken: -

Management committee meet of branches: An important step towards the success of this programme involved meeting with the management committees of these districts to discuss the significance of the Youth Red Cross (YRC). Guidance was provided on implementing YRC in colleges.

d) World Red Cross Day Indian Red Cross Society, Maharashtra with Junior Red Cross celebrated World Red Cross Day on 7th May 2022 at Padmashri Homi J.H. Talyarkhan Memorial Hall, Fort, Mumbai. 50 underprivileged children from Indira Gandhi Memorial Foundation, Cuffe Parade and Navsanjivani Foundation, Kurla Vashi Nakka and Powai were invited with their teachers.



HEALTH PROGRAMS

1. TB Project

A. TB Mitra Program: In India there are around 30,00,000 TB patients out of which 10 lakhs have given consent to share their personal details to receive kits under this program. The details of those patients can be shared with IRCS based on availability of donor and assurance that details will be treated confidentially and used only for the purpose of distribution of kit and rations.

During the year 2022-2023, nearly 32,000 nos. of TB patients were supported by 491 numbers of registered donors. TB Patients were adopted in 16 State/UT branches (Arunachal Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Delhi, Gujarat, Goa, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Nagaland, Punjab and Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh).

B. Prevention & Management of Tuberculosis Including MDR-TB

TB is one of India's major public health problems. According to WHO estimates, India has the world's largest number of tuberculosis patients. Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is playing an increasingly important role in ensuring that TB cases are treated successfully and find out ways & means to minimize stigma and discrimination against patients. With the aim of reducing the burden of MDR TB, IRCS addresses needs of the vulnerable people, arrange for the retreatment of patients and engages with those patients who are likely to default. While undergoing treatment these patients are being followed up and supported to enable full adherence to DOTs. Since 2009, IRCS has been working in support of TB patients in targeted communities in some states.



During the year 2022-2023, nearly 2000 patients were covered in the project districts in the state of Gujarat, Haryana, Karnataka, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh with the adherence rate of above 95%. The project covered awareness meetings, care and support patients counselling, IEC activities & discussion sessions at the government health facilities at their TB units & door to door services. Health checkups & TB screening camps were also organized.

Goals and Objectives:

- To ensure that TB patients, i.e. those who have stopped DOTs treatment without completion, are put back on treatment until they are cured.
- To ensure effectiveness of treatment by providing care and nutritional support to the most vulnerable TB cases.
- Prevention of Multi Drug Resistant TB.
- To reduce the number of deaths, illness and impact from Tuberculosis and MDR TB in target areas.
- To reduce the prevalent stigma and discrimination around TB through behavioral change communication campaign and inclusion of TB patients on important platforms.

a) <u>Haryana:</u> The TB programme was extended in the year 2022-2023 under which a target of 300 TB patients was set in the districts of Faridabad and Palwal. During the year, 435 TB patients were enrolled in Faridabad & Palwal district, out of which 273 were cured, 5 transferred out, 2 failure, 08 deaths 03 defaulters and 139 were under treatment as on 31st March 2023.

Proper attention was paid to awareness activities during the year. In this regard, 30 advocacy awareness meetings and 107 Mohalla meetings were arranged in Faridabad & Palwal by the Red Cross volunteers and district Coordinators so that the TB suspects living very close to the TB patients and others in surrounding areas should come forward for early diagnosis & treatment. Hand bills on the TB were distributed in the community. The volunteers held 1390 and 99 counselling sessions at DOTs centers in Faridabad and Palwal respectively. 2313 and 942 home visits were made by Faridabad and Palwal district coordinators and volunteers.

The adherence report from the Haryana state branch shows that patient's adherence rate is 99%. Following the adherence reports:

b) Punjab: The Irish Red Cross supported the TB Project in the Punjab state branch for the year 2022-2023 under which a target of 500 TB patients was kept in the districts of Amritsar and Jalandhar. Volunteers conducted 1137 counselling sessions at the DOTs centre and made 2948 home visits to TB patients. The project staff and volunteers also organised 160 group awareness meetings and 176 mohalla meetings. The volunteers distributed 8740 TB hand bills.

2. Leprosy Eradication Project

Currently there are 60,000 active lepers in India living in 700 colonies. Every year 1 lakh patients of Leprosy are added out of which 95000 are cured and 5000 cannot be fully cured due to advance stages of Leprosy with development of deformity. Many patients cannot even go to disability Centre to collect disability card which allows them to access certain government facilities free of cost. Red Cross volunteers can help in getting those cards. The high prevalence states are in central India. A patient is required to take medication for 6 months for 1st stage Leprosy and another 6 months for 2nd stage Leprosy. Therefore, early detection is important for recovery. Also, the awareness campaigns for prevention of Leprosy are also useful. In Odisha first aiders are doing ulcer dressing of Lepers and such ulcer dressing kits can also be given to Leper patients.

The state branches were informed to do prevention by spreading awareness and mass screening in slums. These activities can be integrated with existing programs. Volunteers can be trained in special dressing. Livelihood and rehabilitation are also required, and govt. support can be taken to facilitate livelihood for Lepers.

During the year 2022-2023, nearly 8771 not of patients were covered in the project districts in 10 state/UT branches (Andhra Pradesh, goa, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Karnataka, Manipur Nagaland, Odisha, Punjab and Uttar Pradesh).

INFORMATION & PUBLIC RELATIONS



World Health Day: On 7th April, every year World Health Day is observed. From its inception at first health assembly in 1948 and since taking effect in 1950, the celebration has aimed to create awareness of a specific health theme to highlight a priority area of concern for the World Health Organisation. The theme for 2022 World Health Day was Our planet, our health. Messages, broadcasters, rallies marked the occasion all over the country.

World Red Cross Day: World Red Cross Day is an annual celebration of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. World Red Cross Day is celebrated on 8th May every year. This date is the birth anniversary of Jean-Henry Dunant, who was the founder of the Red Cross and the recipient of the first Nobel Peace Prize. The theme for World Red Cross Day 2022 was "#BeHumankind"





World Blood Donor Day: World Blood Donor Day is celebrated on 14th June every year. Voluntary Blood donors are the cornerstones of safe and adequate supply of blood and blood products. The safest blood donors are voluntary, non-remunerated blood donors from low-risk populations. The theme for 2022 campaign was "Donating blood is an act of solidarity. Join the effort and save lives."

World First Aid Day: World First Aid Day is observed the world over on the second Saturday of September. It is being celebrated each year ever since the year 2000. The term "first aid" refers to the assistance given to anyone suffering a sudden injury or illness. Theme for World First Aid Day 2022 was "Lifelong First Aid."





<u>World AIDS Day:</u> World AIDS Day takes place on 1st December each year. It's an opportunity for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, to show support for people living with HIV, and to commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, World AIDS Day was the first ever global health day. <u>The theme for the 2022 World AIDS</u> Day was "Equalize".

OTHER ACTIVITIES



1. Digitization Project

ICRC Cooperation department deployed an ICT Expert, Mr. Alexandre Bole from Geneva from Apr 11-30, 2022, to support the project planning for digital transformation of IRCS. Mr. Alexandre presented his findings and way forward on 29 April, 2022 at IRCS, NHQ.

On 06 Feb 2023, the project focusing on the digital transformation of the Indian Red Cross Society was launched by the Secretary General, IRCS Sh. R K Jain and Head of Regional Delegation, ICRC, Mr. Kedir Omar under the IRCS-ICRC cooperation project. This project aims to significantly improve various processes and communications within and outside IRCS, National Headquarters, warehouses, and state branches.



2. First Aid Online Examination



IRCS, NHQ has been making efforts to streamline the trainings in first aid being held all through the country by the branches. One of the initiatives has been to hold online examinations for evaluating the competence of the trainees. A training program was held for taking the online project at district level on the initiative of the Haryana State Branch under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Sushma Gupta Vice Chairperson. Dr. Mukesh Aggarwal, General Secretary, IRCS & St. John Ambulance (India), Haryana State Branch was also present in the programme.

Training for the online First Aid examination was provided to the District Training officers and officials of all 22 District Branches in Haryana. Dr. Mukesh Aggarwal, General Secretary directed all officers to implement the pilot project in Haryana. Ms. Shikha Chopra, Information Systems Development Manager from IRCS, NHQ, New Delhi was also present during the training session.



3. Inauguration of the National Level Master Trainers Training Camp on First Aid Hon'ble Governor of Telangana Smt. ANDHRA PRADESH

The IRCS, APSB has been in the forefront in providing assistance and relief, during natural and man-made disasters, training communities for disaster preparedness and response, promoting health education and health care, supporting the differently abled, and enthusing the youth of the State to serve those in need through its Junior and Youth Red Cross volunteers. 26 District Branches and 206 Sub District Branches of IRCS are functioning in Andhra Pradesh.

Activities undertaken by the branch during FY 21-22 are as under:

A. Membership Enrolment: -

Membership enrolment during 2022-23 is as under: -

Annual Associates 85 Nos.

Nine hundred & twenty-two educational institutions were registered with an enrolment of 3,28,990 students under Junior Red Cross, and 1,28,670 students under Youth Red Cross during the year 2022-23.

B. **Blood Services**

- ➤ During the FY 2022-23 the IRCS state branch conducted 1174 blood donation camps and collected 65,698 units of blood.
- ➤ 856 Thalessmia patients were registered during this year and 4828 units of blood was issued free of cost to the Thalassemia patients during the year 2022-23.
- ➤ IRCS Blood Centres issue 30% of the blood collected, free of cost, to government hospitals as per the norms of NACO for persons affected by Thalassemia and poor patients.

C. Relief activities and distribution

- Godavari floods: Over 60,000 people were shifted to relief camps from 600 flood affected villages of six districts (East Godavari, West Godavari, Konaseema districts, Eluru, and Paderu) of Andhra Pradesh. About 220 relief camps were set up. Relief materials include tarpaulins, bed sheets, kitchen sets, hygiene kits & nutritional kits were distributed amongst the flood victims.
 - <u>Disaster management emergency equipment supported by National Insurance Company Limited</u>; An agreement was signed between M/s National Insurance Company Limited and IRCS, AP State Branch, on January 28, 2022, for the

establishment of an "Emergency Response Unit" by IRCS-APSB at a cost of Rs 41,47,700/-. The amount is to be funded by NICL under the "CSR scheme. Two vehicles were provided by the Company under this scheme.

IRCS, A.P. State Branch, has received the 2nd installment of Rs. 16,29,332/- from NICL and purchased disaster management and other emergency tools for use in disaster management and relief activities.

- IRCS A.P. state branch distributed nutrition support for TB & Leprosy patients in several district branches of Andhra Pradesh. Over 1851 TB patients were benefited from this distribution program.
- The IRCS, Guntur district branch, distributed 450 wheelchairs to the disabled people.
 Sewing machines, bicycles and smokeless stoves were also distributed amongst tribal women & girl students in Visakhapatnam.
- The IRCS, Guntur District Branch, donated 275 wheelchairs to the Andhra Pradesh State Government and five wheelchairs each to all district branches.

D. <u>Disaster Management Activities</u>

- On the eve of International Disaster Risk Reduction Day, i.e., on October 13, 2022, all 26 district branches of Andhra Pradesh conducted awareness programmes on disaster risk reduction for AASHA workers, SERV, Panchayat Secretaries, Grama Volunteers, and Sachivalaya Secretaries at the respective areas in their districts. Relief activities were also undertaken.
- The IRCS in Srikakulam, Kadapa, and Kurnool took part in heat wave awareness campaigns. Five hundred twenty villages have been covered in 85 days.

E. Capacity Building Activities and Trainings

- First Aid training is imparted by IRCS and APSB to employees working in the corporate sector, both private and public, government organizations, factories, industries, and to students in educational institutions. During the FY 22-23 district branches conducted 239 one-day basic first aid trainings and 107 senior professional first aid training programmes covering 9758 students and employees from various sectors and companies. The IRCS-AP State Branch has received 1816 first aid proficiency certificates from the NHQ.
- ➤ The Power Grid Corporation of India Ltd. has coordinated with the Red Cross to conduct one-day basic First Aid Training programmes for their employees who were posted in 11 locations in Andhra Pradesh. APSDMA, A.P. SIRD, and the Indian Red Cross Society jointly organized the APADA MITHRA Training Programmes, with 67 trainings in which 5737 volunteers were trained from 25 districts in Andhra Pradesh. It was a 12-day residential training programme that was planned in all 26 districts.

F. J/YRC Activities

- IRCS Nellore district branch deputed Junior Red Cross students (12) and counsellors (02) to attend the National Youth Exchange Programme from December 24th to 29th, 2022, at Bharatiya Vidya S.L. Public School, Amritsar (Punjab).
- IRCS APSB deputed 8 YRC volunteers to participate in the Inter State Youth Red Cross Training Camp for Boys held from March 16th to March 21st, 2023, at Gita Gyan Sansthanam, near Braham Sarover, Kurukshetra, Haryana.
- 1,23,716 trees were planted by the volunteers in villages, streets, and prominent places with the support of all key stakeholders in their respective districts, i.e., Srikakulam, Tirupati, and Vizianagaram.

G. Other Activities

- IRCS-District Branches organized health & mega health camps in their respective districts for the needy and poor and distributed free medicines.
- Screening camp was organized on 23rd and 24th July 2022 in which measurements were taken of the limbs of the people who required artificial legs and hands. This camp was organized with the support of Bhagawan Mahaveer Vikalang Sahayata Samiti, Jaipur, which was managed by Rajmal Khemaraj Bhandari Foundation, Raichur. 500 people attended the screening.
- The A.P. State Branch has initiated an innovative eye screening programme in collaboration with the popular eye hospital, L.V. Prasad Eye Institute, Hyderabad, and has conducted eye screening camps for all orphan children residing in licensed childcare institutes in all districts of Andhra Pradesh. Total 8108 children were screened under this program.
- On the advice of Hon'ble Governor the A.P Red Cross branch decided to reach remotest locations/ tribal areas (Chenchu, Cheedika, Gabbilala Gondhi) and provided groceries, mosquito nets, hygiene kits, kitchen sets, blankets, tarpaulins, clothes, and chappals to the tribals. Apart from the distribution of these items the team also conducted a multispecialty medical camp, eye check-up camp and distributed medicines.
- Government of Andhra Pradesh is going to establish Inclusive Centres in all Government and Government aided Degree colleges in Andhra Pradesh under the Commissioner of Collegiate Education to strengthen the youth in fighting the social evils and to create awareness on issues like trafficking, counselling, entrepreneur development, legal literacy and Youth Red Cross. AP Red Cross will be the Nodal Implementing Agency for these Inclusive Centres.
- During the year poor patients received free medicines from IRCS, Srikakulam District Branch medicine bank. Free medicines were also supplied to the prisoners through the District Jails Department.
- IRCS Tirupati District Branch took over management of the IRCS Generic Medical Shop on January 1, 2023. IRCS SPSR Nellore Dist Branch Simhapuri Sanjeevani Generic Medicals serves needy patients 7 days a week, without break. It served 42,934 people

throughout the year. Vizianagaram District Branch runs one Pradana Mantri Janaushadi Kendra Medical Shop.

- From December 15th to December 19th ,2022, IRCS NTR District Youth Red Cross volunteers offered their services for devotees of Bhavani situated on the Indrakiladri hill of Kanaka Durga temple.
- During the year 5960 patients have registered, 1016 surgeries performed, 567 patients treated with radio therapy, 4484 patients given chemotherapy, at IRCS, Cancer hospital, Nellore.
- ARV clinic was opened in 1996 to treat dog-bite and animal-bite victims. During the year 12,808 people benefitted by ARV center. 12665 anti-rabies vaccinations and 1550 hepatitis-B vaccines were given to the patients in anti-rabies vaccination (ARV) clinic.
- During the year counselling was given to 2342 HIV/AIDS patients.
- The Kalyan Magatapalli eye donation centre was started in 2008. So, far 831 corneas have been collected from 416 eye donors and handed over to M/s. Mohsin Eye Bank, Visakhapatnam.
- The Indian Red Cross Society, Kakinada District Branch constructed a Red Cross Home for Seniors at Santosh Nagar of Vakalapudi village of Kakinada Rural Mandal in the year 2010. The construction of the 1st and 2nd floors was completed with the financial support of Rs. 50 lakhs by ONGC and Rs. 44 lakhs by Sri Karuturi family members in the USA. Now the home can provide accommodations to 75 senior citizens.
- The IRCS, SPSR Nellore District Branch, runs a centre since August 2000 for kids with mental retardation and cerebral palsy. The centre now has 148 students and 20 employees. During the year 2022-23, 73 children joined the Spastic centre.
- The Red Cross, Guntur district branch is running a Children's Home since 1972 in Guntur for orphans aged between 6 and 16 years. During the year the Home had 13 inmates.
- The IRCS, West Godavari District Branch is running one MPHW (F) Training Institute since 1986. The trainees are selected from West Godavari and East Godavari District Branches. Eighty candidates were trained during the year.
- Freezer Boxes are also provided for preserving dead bodies in Kakinada, Vizianagaram,
 Srikakulam, Kavali and Nellore. These services were utilized by 162 families.
- Sewing centres are being run in Srikakulam, Kakinada and Kurnool Districts 362 people have benefited during the year.

ARUNACHAL PRADESH

A. Celebration of Important Days



World Red Cross Day with the theme #BeHumanKIND was celebrated with destitute and orphaned children of OJU Mission School, Naharlagun on 8th May, 2022. 1300 blankets,201 hygiene kits and 1-month essential food items were donated to OJU Welfare Association by the state branch.

B. <u>Distribution of Relief Items</u>

➤ IRCS, Arunachal Pradesh State Branch, in collaboration with IRCS, West Siang District Branch, provided aid to fire victims at Yingkiong market line, Upper Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh. The items distributed consisted of 100 hygiene kits, 100 blankets, and cash assistance of Rs.50,000.





➤ IRCS APSB, Naharlagun on 9th June, 2022, distributed 'blankets, hygiene kits and Rs.25,000/ (Rs.5,000/- each) to the bereaved family members of 5 deceased victims of landslide on Ganga to Jollang road and Yagumso Colony on 16th May,2022.

On July 15, 2022, the State Branch team visited F-Sector, Naharlagun, and Upper Hollongi and distributed Blankets, Hygiene Kits, and essential food items (Rice, Dal, Salt, Cooking oil) to ICR landslide victims whose houses had been destroyed.



On October 16, 2022, the IRCS, Arunachal Pradesh State Branch distributed relief items to fire victims of Manchal Village, Anjaw District, in which three houses were destroyed, resulting in loss of property and the displacement of seventeen families. ➤ Relief materials was distributed amongst fire victims at Forest Colony, F-Sector, Naharlagun on 24th October,2022.



- The victims of the Banderdewa fire disaster, which occurred on November 26th, 2023, received relief assistance.
- ➤ Help was offered to 06 families affected by the Karsingsa fire in Arunachal Pradesh on January 24, 2023.
- Relief assistance was provided to 38, fire victim families of C- Sector, Forest Colony, Itanagar, Papumpare District, Arunachal Pradesh.





➤ Indian Red Cross Society, Arunachal Pradesh State Branch provided immediate relief to the fire victims in Jipu Village in Likabali on 4th February 2023

C. Blood Services

➤ A Blood donation camp was held at the premises of OJU Welfare Association on 11th June,2022. A total of 18 units of blood was collected.





➤ To mark the 75th anniversary of India's independence, a blood donation camp was organized at Raj Bhawan in Itanagar on July 29, 2022. 141 units of blood were collected.

CHANDIGARH

A. Projects

Annapurna Akshayapatra Yojana

Indian Red Cross Society, U.T. Branch, Chandigarh initiated a project "ANNAPURNA AKSHAYPATRA" on 2nd January, 2017 to provide affordable, hygienic and nutritious diet to the labourers, Industrial workers and other needy. The food is being distributed at 10 different locations in Chandigarh. At present, daily 2000 to 2500 food packets are being distributed at these locations. During the year 669535 food packets have been distributed to various locations of Chandigarh from 01.04.2022 to 31.03.2023.

Infosys Red Cross Sarai, PGIMER, Chandigarh

To provide safe and comfortable accommodation at very reasonable rates to attendants of the patients admitted in PGIMER, Chandigarh, the Red Cross Society in association with Infosys constructed a building called INFOSYS FOUNDATION - RED CROSS SARAI in the campus of PGI. It has 254 beds. Total 81818 persons availed the facilities from 01.04.2022 to 31.03.2023.

Plaza baithak for senior citizen

U.T., Branch, Chandigarh has started a project called 'PLAZA BAITHAK' for the Welfare of Senior Citizen in Plaza, Sector 17, Chandigarh. The project was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Advisor to the Administrator-cum-President, IRCS on 13.10.2021. In this project Indian Red Cross Society has setup seating arrangement for Senior Citizens at Park Plaza with facilities of newspaper and books, carrom board etc., so that they can spend some quality and stress-free time. During the year 13098 Senior Citizens availed the facility.

Chandigarh palliative care services

This project is being run in collaboration with Department of Radiotherapy PGIMER, Chandigarh for terminally ill cancer patients. The services are provided free of cost at three levels; Hospital Palliative Care, Home Care and Hospice.

Laser pain relief & physiotherapy center

Laser pain relief & physiotherapy center is being run at Chandigarh Hospice, Sector 43, Chandigarh with the support of Gramuday Trust.

Ambulance & funeral van services

Providing Ambulance and Funeral Van Services to the needy person is one of the major activities of the U.T Branch. Under this project, the Society is maintaining a 24x7 Control Room in its building at Karuna Sadan, Sector 11-B, Chandigarh.

B. **Blood Services**

Blood donation camps

The U.T Branch organized 29 Blood Donation Camps during the year in which 1885 units of blood were collected.

- ➤ <u>15th AUGUST,2022- PARTICIPATION IN MARCH PAST PARADE & FIRST AID POST.</u> First Aid Post was set up on Independence Day 2022 Celebrations with the help of volunteers under the banner of IRCS.
- 26th JANUARY,2023 REPUBLIC DAY PARTICIPATION FIRST AID POST & DISPLAY OF TABLEAU. First Aid Post was set up on Republic Day-2023 with the help of volunteers under the banner of IRCS.

DELHI BRANCH

A. Response to Covid-19

- IRCS, Delhi Branch organized 3 Covid-19 Vaccination Camp at Red Cross Bhawan, Golf Links on 30.08.2022, 5.09.2022 and 3.12.2022. 69 persons were vaccinated.
- During the year 2022-23 total 118 persons were vaccinated in the Red Cross hospital run by IRCS, Delhi Branch.



B. IRCS, Delhi branch conducted following activities for Fund Raising: -

- Delhi UT branch raised funds amounting to Rs 2.38 lakhs approx. by placing 80 donation boxes at key locations like malls, hospitals, schools and shops. Donations from individuals and charitable trusts were also received.
- Delhi Branch enrolled 12 Life Members during the Financial Year 2022-23. One Institutional Member was also enrolled during the Year.

C. Celebration of Important Days

IRCS, Delhi Branch celebrates Flag Day week from 1st to 7th November every year. The state branch calls on Hon'ble President of India and Hon'ble Lt. Governor, Delhi every year during the fund-raising campaign and collects donation from them.





During flag week Delhi Branch placed 315 donation boxes at various places in Delhi like Schools, Malls etc. A sum of Rs. 2,81,796/- was received through donation boxes.

D. **Blood Services**



23 **Blood Donation Camps** were organized at Red Cross Bhawan, Golf Links and Seemapuri Hospital. Total 569 units of blood were collected. Teams from Red Cross Blood Center NHQ collected blood at camps.

E. Distribution of relief items

- ➤ Delhi branch distributed 3457 hygiene kits, 1164 set of soaps and 1173 face masks amongst needy and vulnerable people at different locations in Delhi.
- ➤ Delhi branch distributed 200 blankets at different locations in Delhi.

G. Other Activities

- i. <u>Awareness & prevention of drug</u> <u>abuse programme: -</u>
- IRCS, Delhi Branch organized the Drug Abuse Program on 12.08.2022 at HSK Sarvodaya Bal Vidyalaya Lajpat Nagar New Delhi. 642 students and teachers participated in the program.



- IRCS, Delhi Branch organized the 30 Drug
 Abuse Awareness Program in schools during November and December 2022. 5257 students and 298 teachers participated in the program.
- IRCS, Delhi Branch organized 8 Drug Abuse Awareness Programs in private schools during March 2023. 600 students and 83 teachers participated in the program.

ii. Measles Rubella (MR) awareness campaign programme: -



Measles awareness campaign was carried out by different health teams of Southeast district in the month of December 2022. During the awareness campaign leaflets and approx. 250 hygiene kits were distributed. In February 2023, 10 volunteers of IRCS, Delhi branch participated in one month survey related work of Measles Rubella and Measles awareness campaign.

iii. Adoption of TB patients for Nutritional Support:

- Red Cross Hospital provided nutritional support to TB patients during the year. 190 nutritional kits were distributed amongst TB patients.
- ITC Limited has adopted 500 TB patients for a period of 6 months and they donated 1500 nutritional kits during January - March 2023 through IRCS, Delhi Branch to TB Patients at Nehru Nagar.



- The branch received Rs. 6.21Cr. and 3.20 Crore from M/s Pragati Power Corporation Ltd and M/s Delhi Transco Ltd. Fund were used to provide 22660 nutritional kits to TB patients at 168 PHIs in Delhi in partnership with the Health Department in the month of February and March 2023.
- An amount of Rs. 3.75 lakhs was received from M/s Afcons Ltd. for the distribution of nutritional kits amongst TB patients.



- The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) held a basic emergency care course training at the Delhi branch hospital from July 29 to August 14, 2022. This was the first program of its sort to take place in South-East Asia. During this program, doctors and paramedics from the IRCS from all over India were trained.
- ➤ In Delhi, an English medium middle school is running under the Indian Red Cross Society in the name of the founder of the Red Cross Movement, Mr. Henry Dunant. The total strength of the students in the session 2022-23 was 173 including 34 students from economically weaker section of society.

Goa

A. Blood Services

➢ Blood Donation Camps: 19 Blood donation camps were conducted by IRCS, Goa branch in collaboration with blood bank, Goa Medical College, Bambolim, Goa & Asilo Blood Bank, Mapusa. Altogether 783 units of blood were collected.



B. Relief Services



ltems such as bath soaps, laundry soaps, detergent cake, coconut oil, toothpaste, toothbrush, disposable shaving razors, sanitary napkins, included in Hygiene kits were distributed through IRCS Taluka branch to the municipality workers in rural areas and the needy people. About 3000 people benefited.

Kitchen sets were distributed by IRCS amongst needy people.



The Senior Citizens are taken for picnic also. Weekly medical check-up including eye checkup, dental checkup and ECG are done for all seniors by experienced doctors.

E. <u>Drug-de-Addiction Centers</u>

Two Drug-de-addiction and Counselling Centers are run by the District Red Cross Branches i.e., Faridabad and Rohtak. During the year Faridabad centre registered 611 cases and 611 cases were detoxified. Rohtak center registered 1575 cases and 553 cases were detoxified.



F. Working Women Hostels

Presently, four Working Women Hostels are being run in the State of Haryana at Faridabad, Gurugram, Kurukshetra and Rohtak. During the year 2022-23, Faridabad had 28, Gurugram 22, Kurukshetra 29 and Rohtak 36 inmates.

G. Old Age Home

Old age homes are being run at Ambala, Panchkula, Panipat, Kaithal & Gururam. During the year 2022-23, there were 49 inmates at Ambala, 20 inmates at Panchkula,10 inmates at Panipat, 23 inmates at Kaithal and 22 inmates at Gurugram. A total of 124 inmates were benefited.

H. Rehabilitation and Physiotherapy Centers

Twelve Rehabilitation centers are being run by District Red Cross Branches, namely Ambala, Faridabad, Kurukshetra, Karnal, Rewari, Narnaul, Rohtak, Hisar, Jind, Sirsa, Kaithal and Yamuna Nagar.

During the year, Artificial limbs/aids & appliances were provided to physically handicapped persons free of cost through ALIMCO, Kanpur such as 1,144 tricycles, 1,000 motorized tricycles, 2,768 hearing aids, 869 wheel chairs,12 blind sticks, 2,210 walking sticks, 1,970 crutches, 159 Jaipur foot, 305 prosthesis, 619 calipers, 6,861 air batteries, 266 MSIED kits, 157 smart phones,102 rollators, 67 C.P. chairs, 08 crutch axillas, 428 shoes, 850 knee belts,



271 cervical collar fiexoes, 414 back side belts, 452 lumbosacrat belts, 496 spects, 43 folding wheel chairs, 338 wheel chairs with commode, 417 chairs with commode,635 dentures, 17 foldable walkers, 04 tripods, 158 silicon form cushions, 1532 knee brace kits, 547 foot care kits

and 2822 other aids amounting to Rs.10,73,85,235/-

Physiotherapy services are provided in 08 Rehabilitation Centres, namely Panchkula, Yamuna Nagar, Kurukshetra, Faridabad, Narnaul, Jhajjar, Hisar, Jind and Kaithal. 10998 persons were benefited by the physiotherapy services during the Year.

I. Family Welfare Centers

These centers are being run in 7 Districts i.e., Fatehabad, Jhajjar, Narnaul, Panipat, Rewari, Sirsa and Yamuna Nagar. During the year 587 sterilization cases were attended too.

J. Hospital Welfare Services

These services are provided in all the districts for the patients. Free medicines are provided to needy patients where no help comes from anywhere. During the year 609 awareness camps, 485 health checkup camps, 148001 patients checked, 04 patients helped from CM relief fund, 05 patients received help from Diagnostic centers and 38 patients admitted in hospitals in HUDA land.

K. M & CH Centers

Presently, four Maternity Child Health Centers are being run by District Red Cross Branches i.e., Jhajjar, Panipat, Sirsa and Yamuna Nagar. During the year a total of 1442 vitamin solutions were distributed, 314 BCG, 1497 DPT/Penta, 937 MMR Measles cases were handled and a total of 1052 people benefited from the polio drops.

L. Rain Basera (Night Shelter Homes)

During the winter season all the District Red Cross Branches provided free night shelter homes through its 31 centers. During the year 16719 homeless persons were benefitted.



★ T.B. Project



TB Project is being implemented for retreatment of most vulnerable TB patients in all the District Red Cross Branches in Haryana. During the year 79 donors adopted 457 TB patients for nutrition support in the 16 Districts. 68 screening/health check-up camps were held in 20 District Red Cross Branches in which 6847 people were benefited.

Leprosy Project

Awareness programme against Leprosy was organized at various districts (Ambala, Panchkula, Narnaul, Rohtak and Jhajjar) of Haryana. 104 leprosy affected people were traced.

supported 10 patients for six months. Wardha District branch supported 4 patients for six months. Shrirampur district branch initiated a Leprosy detection campaign and Tuberculosis detection campaign under the Pradhan Mantri TB & Leprosy eradication program.

F. Other activities

I. Bel-Air super-specialty hospital at Wai was inaugurated on 19th March 2023 by Sh. Ramesh Bais, Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra & President of IRCS, Maharashtra State Branch. The hospital has 73 beds with a medical ICU, a surgical ICU, a Paediatric ICU and a Neonatal ICU, Blood Centre, two modern



operation theatres, maternity wards, and general wards. There are Super Specialty OPD clinics. It is equipped with full-fledged diagnostic facilities with MRI, CT scan, USG / Color Doppler, Digital X-ray, and a pathological lab.

- II. Fitch Group of Companies, Mumbai, disbursed Rs. 34 lakhs for Indian Red Cross Society Ulhasnagar Sub-District Branch for purchasing medical equipment for pathology, dental & ophthalmic departments.
- III. Nihchal Israni Foundation donated Rs. 5 lakhs for poor patients' treatment at Bel Air Hospital & Rs 3 lakh for under privileged students for Diploma in Medical Laboratory Training (DMLT) at Bel Air Institute.
- IV. Educational visits: On 23rd March 2023 at the request of Principal of ITM HIS College of Nursing, New Panvel, 30 students and 1 faculty visited Red Cross, Maharashtra State Branch as part of the 4th year B.Sc. Nursing curriculum. Students were enlightened on the philosophy, mission, function and physical set up of the Indian Red Cross Society. Mr. Charles S. Pal Exe. Secretary apprised the students.

B. Capacity Building Activities and Trainings

- ➤ The Manipur State Branch Junior Red Cross team participated in the National Integration Camp held at Amritsar during the last week of December, 2022. The Manipur team secured 2 first prizes and 3 second prizes out of 6 competitions and was declared the overall runners-up.
- ➤ With a view to strengthened the Red Cross movement among the youth, 4 Junior Red Cross Units were established in four Higher Secondary Schools, three Government schools and one private school. In addition, 56 Youth Red Cross units have been established in 45 colleges in the state with at least 20 volunteers per unit. Induction programs have been conducted in 25 colleges.

C. Other Activities

- ➤ Basic Life Support Ambulance was received from the NHQ which has been made available at subsidized rates to the needy. In addition, one new van was donated by Shri Huidrom Vikram, social activist and a car by G.P. Prasain, Vice Chancellor of Tripura University. Both are Patrons of the Indian Red Cross Society.
- Installation of video conferencing facilities at the branch office has strengthened the functioning of the branch. Installation was done with the support of the IFRC and IRCS, NHQ.
- First Aid Posts were set up in district branches during various events like Republic Day, Independence Day etc., for providing immediate assistance to those in need.
- ➤ During the year a total of 80 beneficiaries under the Livelihood Project, Ashagi Mangal were selected, trained, and provided with support of Rs. 50,000/- each. With this 4th batch, a total of 322 widows benefited from this project.
- ➤ The Branch conducted more than 400 awareness programs on COVID, besides participating in several panel discussions in the local TV channels for the benefit of the general public.

D. Relief Assistance

- ➤ The State Branch provided immediate relief to more than 20 families whose houses have been burnt. In addition, it provided immediate relief to about 50 families affected by flood in 2022 in Nambol area. The state branch was the first responder to the Kamjong incident where many houses were destroyed during arson.
- 6 medical camps were held during the year at far off places like Ashang Khunou, Pherzawl, New Somtal, Kwatha, Jiribam etc. Free medicines were provided to the needy. Nearly 1000 people attended the camps and were benefited.
- ➤ 4000 hygiene kits and 3000 blankets received from the IRCS, NHQ were distributed amongst children and senior citizens at old age homes during the period.
- National Headquarters provided 52 Oxygen concentrators, some of which were passed on to the district branches. The State Branch with the remaining 30 Oxygen concentrators maintain a bank which was provided to recovering patients. A total of 284 recovering patients have been benefitted.



C. Relief Services




IRCS-OSB distributed relief materials amongst the flood victims in different flood affected locations of Odisha during the year.

C. Relief Distribution

Punjab State Red Cross Branch also provided services to the poor & needy patients at PGI, Chandigarh. These patients were provided free medicines. During the Year State Branch spent Rs. 16,27,916/- for providing free medicines to the needy patients.

D. Capacity Building Activities and Trainings

➤ The Punjab State Branch of IRCS organized an Inter State Junior Red Cross Camp from 24th to 29th December 2022 at Bhartiya Vidya Bhawan's S.L. Public School, Amritsar. In this camp, 268 students and teachers from 12 different states of India i.e Andhra Pradesh, Chandigarh,

To boost up the Youth Red Cross activity in the colleges, the Punjab State Branch organized two days Youth Red Cross Counsellors Workshop from 14th to 15th March 2023 at Mata Gujri College, Sri. Fatehgarh Sahib. The professors (YRC counselors) from 35 colleges participated in the workshop. The closing ceremony was held on 15th March 2023. Sh. Shivdular Singh Dhillon, Secretary, Punjab State Red Cross Branch was the chief guest. Apart from the other activities, training on First Aid and Fire Safety was also imparted during the workshop.



➤ The Punjab State Red Cross Branch organised State Level Youth Red Cross Camp from 27-31 March, 2023 at Chandigarh University. 92 Students (Boys & Girls) along with Teacher / Counsellors and Youth Red Cross volunteers from the Universities / Colleges of various Districts participated in the Camp. Visit to Kalpana Chawla Space Centre developed by Chandigarh University was also arranged.

F. Project

HIV/AIDS Project; A Care & Support Centre is being run at Saket Hospital, Patiala by the Punjab State Red Cross Branch, Chandigarh. This project is being sponsored by National Coalition of People Living with HIV in India (NCPI+), New Delhi. More than a thousand people benefited from them during the year.



The activities held under this project during the year 2022-23 are as under: -

- Psychosocial support to people living with HIV/ AIDS =1414 persons
- No. of families provided voluntary counselling & testing services = 453
- No. of families provided economical and govt. social welfare support = 812
- No. of group awareness meetings conducted =12



➤ Integrated & Rehabilitation Centres for Drug Addicts: The Punjab Red Cross is running 4 Integrated & Rehabilitation Centres for drug addicts at Khanpur, Patiala, S.B.S. Nagar & Gurdaspur. During the year total 6057 indoor & outdoor patients were treated and many people were educated through awareness camps. 372 free medical check-up camps were organized and 43527 persons were reached through these camps.

Patient care attendant services: Hospital Welfare Section of Punjab Red Cross provides Patient Care Attendant Services to the patients and old age persons at their homes on regular basis. As many as 46 persons were trained as Patient Care Attendant during the year.

G. Other Activities

Punjab State Red Cross Branch provided 24x7 hours services through ambulance vans and funeral vans at subsidized rates. The branch has a fleet of 6 ambulances (AC as well as non-AC) and 3 funeral vans. Each ambulance van was provided with a First Aid Box & First Aid Trained driver. During the year, the State Red Cross Branch had served hundreds of people by providing them with ambulance services and funeral vans.

Social Service Camps:

a) Punjab State Red Cross provides first aid training to its members and others. Besides, first aid & ambulance services are being provided to the communities in the event of a disaster

- and during public gatherings. During the year first aid and ambulance services were provided to the visiting pilgrims at Shri Fatehgarh Sahib from 26-12-22 to 28-12-22. 508 people were provided with first aid and one person was transported to the hospital.
- b) Punjab State Branch in collaboration with District Administration, District Health Department and District Red Cross Branch, Sri Muktsar Sahib organized Social Service Camp by setting up 7 first aid posts in the mela area along with ambulance vans. On these posts Red Cross staff along with a team of 24 Red Cross volunteers provided round the clock services to the visiting pilgrims. Medicines were provided free of cost by the State as well as the District Red Cross Branch. 702 persons were treated and provided medicines on 13-14 January 2023 at these first aid posts and 02 injured were transported to the local Hospital.
- c) Punjab State Branch organized a social service camp on Holla Mohalla in collaboration with District Red Cross Branch, Ropar from 06th to 08th March 2023. During the festival 20 first aid posts were set up with 204 volunteers. Thousands of pilgrims were provided with medical aid and medicines. 09 patients were transported to the local hospital and 11 lost children were re-united with their parents.

Stories of the Year;

Umeed ki kiran.....A ray of hope



Andhra Pradesh Red Cross team visited Palutla, tribal hamlet in Nallamala reserved forest in Yerragondapalem Mandal in Prakasam district. They traveled 50 Kms inside the deep forest from Yerragondapalem. It took them 4 hours to reach there. It was a challenging trip, as there were no proper roads and it was in a dense forest. There was only one solar lamp in the entire hamlet, where the team stayed. The team of volunteers, including the Andhra Pradesh state branch Chairman, Dr.

Arumalla Sridhar Reddy, slept in the Red Cross tents and they took bath, shaved and brushed in the waterfalls. They provided 200 kitchen sets, each worth Rs 5,000 (containing 30 items) together with hygiene kits, tarpaulins, blankets, sarees, dhotis, footwear and many more items to the vulnerable and needy. They also conducted a mega medical camp, including dental, & provided medicines. The dedication and commitment of the Red Cross volunteers and the officials of the state branch towards serving the poor and needy are really commendable.



AP Red Cross concentrates on the Welfare of Tribals in Unreachable Areas

The Alluri Sitharama Raju (ASR) district of Andhra Pradesh contains the small hamlet of Gabbilala Gondhi, which is situated at the base of a forest. The "Konda Reddis" tribe resides in an isolated hamlet that is far from mainstream society.

The Konda Reddis are one of the most backward tribal groups present in India. It is a prominent community in Andhra Pradesh. They live in the hilly forest regions of Alluri Sitharama Raju District and Srikakulam (Andhra Pradesh) on both banks of the Godavari River. They live in interior forest areas that are largely cut off from the outside world. Traditionally, they were shifting cultivators, and recently, some of them have adopted settled agriculture and horticulture. The collection of non-timber forest products and basket-making supplement the sources of their



livelihood. The tribals live in small mud, bamboo, and thatched houses. There is no electricity in this area.



Dr. A. Sridhar Reddy, Chairman of the AP Red Cross, has instructed the state branch and district branch to conduct a survey of the tribal hamlet in order to enable the Red Cross to conduct a service programme in that village after receiving the information from the neighborhood Mandal Revenue Officer. On March 19, 2023, Chairman Dr. Sridhar Reddy personally led a group of Red Cross personnel and volunteers and organized a Mega Service Camp in that hamlet, bringing with him a

group of medical experts. Everyone received a health checkup, and medicines were also given. Eye screening camp for the tribals was also held. Eye specialists have screened the vision of senior citizens and prescribed refractory glasses, which were handed over by the AP Red Cross.

Visiting Myanmarese Nationals coming into India by Crossing International Border due to Conflict in Myanmar.

Myanmar is a bordering country to the state of Manipur, India. Moreh town of Manipur is bordering Myanmar which is 110 Kms away from Imphal. Because of the political unrest and internal conflicts in Myanmar, many Myanmarese nationals came to Moreh, Tengnoupal District (India) by crossing the International Border. They are taking shelter at Moreh and many neighboring villages in India. A team of Indian Red Cross Society, Manipur State Branch consisting of Dr. Y. Mohen Singh – Vice President, Narendra Ningomba – Chairman, Athokpam Nabachandra –General Secretary, Premjit



Naoroibam – Treasurer, L. Kuber Meetei – MC Member, L. Rajesh Singh – Volunteer and Y. Sanjit Singh – EC Member went to Moreh in the early morning of 29th March, 2023 at 6.30 am.

The team along with three volunteers of Moreh namely Chandrajit Sharma, R. Krishna and Amit Nath visited two other villages namely Ngamun and Lhangcham village. The team met with some of the Myanmarese nationals who took shelter in these villages. Around 3000 Myanmarese came to the Indian side by crossing the International Border, but the team came across around 300 in these two villages. The team distributed 100 numbers of Mosquito Nets and 50 numbers of Hygiene Kits to them. The team had a meeting with the volunteers of Moreh and discussed about opening Tengnoupal District Branch.

In the festival of light and pleasure, Deepawali, he went to the leprosy colony with some of his volunteers to light diya in front of the houses of these poor and excluded community and share happiness with them. The team also distributed sweets to all of them and cherished the joy lit on their faces. When everybody was busy in their own celebration of Diwali with their family, at that time, Boudh YRC volunteers thought about these poor & helpless people and enjoyed the festival of lights with them.
